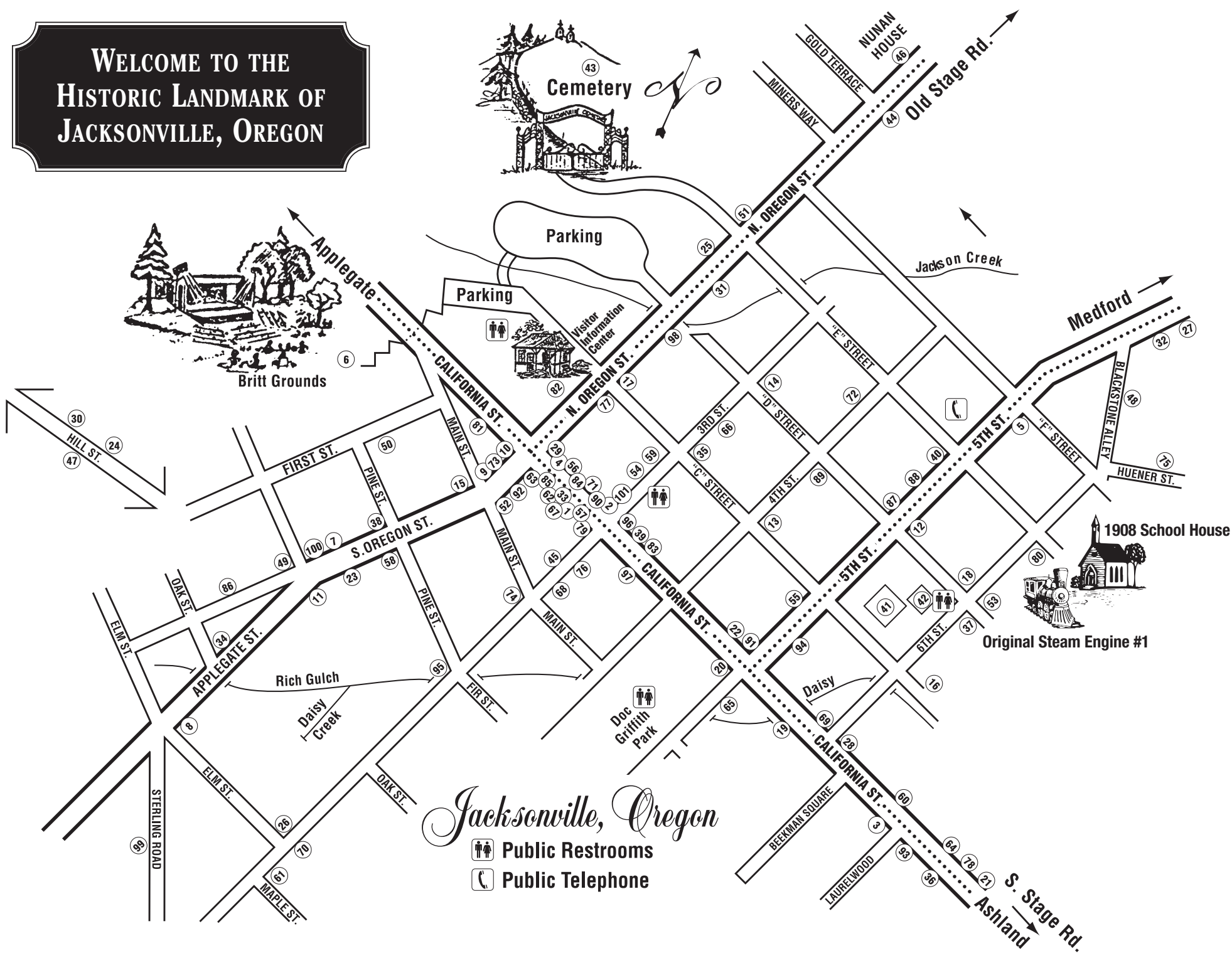

**The Jacksonville Story...**  
*Jacksonville was started in 1851 with the discovery of gold in Rich Gulch, off Daisy Creek. And, unlike many communities of its day, it did not become a ghost town when the gold ran out. Instead it became a well-known trade center.*

*With the advent of the railroad, and because of the location, Jacksonville was bypassed, and Medford was born in 1886. A privately owned spur ran to Jacksonville until 1927 when the County seat was moved to Medford, and there was little reason to come here.*

*During the Depression Jacksonville folk survived by digging tunnels under the town and mining the gold that is still there.*

*The town survived and the world passed her by until the 1960's when U.S. Bank came in and restored the U.S. Hotel and the County Courthouse became first a Museum, and is now a coveted gathering spot for special events.*

*The entire town is a National Historic District, and a visit with us is like a step back in time.*

# Experience the Walking Map Highlights of Jacksonville, Oregon and step into the Lasting Memories of Another Era.

**1. ANDERSON & GLEN GEN. MDSE. 1856**  
A post office in 1884.

**2. BEEKMAN BANK 1863**  
C.C. Beekman was both banker and express agent. His bank closed in 1912 and remains intact. May be viewed from front, side, and back windows.

**3. BEEKMAN HOUSE 1876**  
Home of C.C. Beekman gold freighter, Wells Fargo agent and banker. Open Summer by arrangement. Admission.

**4. BELLA UNION SALOON 1856**  
Also housed BURPEE AND LINN FURNITURE STORE in middle 1800's.

**5. B.F. DOWELL HOUSE 1859** ⇄  
Dowell, an attorney and newspaper editor, was active in State government. Daughter was one of the first female lawyers. Home has been continually occupied by family.

**6. BRITT PARK c1852**  
Peter Britt, early photographer and horticulturist. Home and studio destroyed by fire in 1957. Building contour re-created 1976. Site of Annual Britt Music Festivals. June, July, and August.

**7. BOOKER HOUSE c1880** ⇄

**8. BROAD HOUSE c1880** ⇄

**9. BRUNNER BUILDING 1855.**  
Oldest surviving brick building in Jacksonville. Erected for J.S. BRUNNER & BROS. GEN MDSE.

**10. BUTCHER SHOP 1854**  
Owned & operated by John Orth. Served as first Post Office in 1862.

**11. CAMERON HOUSE c1870** ⇄  
Theodric Cameron operated a general merchandise store serving the Sterling Creek Mine area.

**12. CATHOLIC SCHOOL c1860** ⇄  
St. Mary's Academy.

**13. CATHOLIC RECTORY 1861**  
Built as a private residence. Later used for a parish house. Interior may be viewed from porches and windows. Visitors welcome.

**14. CHRIS KEEGAN HOUSE c1880** ⇄

**15. CITY HALL, 1880-81**  
Built on the site of the burned out Maury and Davis store.

**16. COUNTY CLERKS OFFICE c1885** ⇄  
Originally located on the SE corner of the Courthouse grounds and used as an office by early county officials.

**17. COMBEST HOUSE c1862** ⇄ ⇄  
Originally built by John Sifers in 1862. Additions by Charles Savage. Classic Revival Design

**18. DAVIDSON HOUSE c1870** ⇄

**19. DeROBOAM HOUSE c1880** ⇄

**20. DR. J. W. McCULLY HOUSE 1860** ⇄ ⇄ ★  
Dr. McCully came to Jacksonville in 1852. The home was occupied by members of the family until 1944. Mrs. McCully had a children's school in the house before public schools were established.

**21. DR. MARTIN VROOMAN HOUSE 1878** ⇄  
One of early physicians in area.

**22. DR. WILL JACKSON HOUSE 1868** ⇄ ⇄  
A dentist, Dr. Jackson had the first telephone in town and donated the property next door to Western Electric Telephone Co.

**23. EAGLE BREWERY SALOON 1856** ⇄  
Constructed and operated by J.J. Holeman, purchased by Joseph Wetterer in 1860. Served the community until the early 1900's.

**24. EATON HOUSE 1880** ⇄  
Part of a 20 acre placer claim to Irene Eaton — one of the oldest surviving structures in the immediate vicinity.

**25. ELIAS JACOBS HOUSE 1868** ⇄ ⇄

**26. FEHELY HOUSE 1868** ⇄  
Patrick Fehely constructed many houses and buildings in Jacksonville. This two-story home was built with brick from his own kiln.

**27. FICK HOUSE 1888** ⇄ ⇄

**28. FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH 1881**  
Built of sugar pine hauled from Roseburg. Stained glass windows came from Italy via Cape Horn.

**29. FISHER BROS. GEN. MDSE. 1856**  
The site of the first trading tent in Jacksonville, 1854. Later the Marble Corner Saloon.

**30. FRANCOIS LORAN HOUSE 1896** ⇄  
"Box Construction" — One of a group of Frenchman intent on establishing a wine industry here.

**31. GEORGE HAYES HOUSE 1888** ⇄  
George Hayes, an early day blacksmith.

**32. GEORGE WENDT HOUSE 1910** ⇄  
Home continuously owned by Wendt family.

**33. GLEN DRUM HOTEL & GEN. MDSE. c1856**  
This two-story brick building has at various times housed a grocery store, variety store and a saloon. Street floor and entry have been altered.

**34. GOLD MARKER 1851**  
Site of original gold discovery by James Cluggage and J.R. Poole.

**35. HARRIS-CHAMBERS HOUSE c1856** ⇄

**36. HATTIE REAMES WHITE HOUSE 1891** ⇄  
Built by Thomas Reames for his daughter upon her marriage.

**37. HENRY JUDGE HOUSE c1885** ⇄  
A pioneer in the saddlery business — one of the wealthiest prominent residents.

**38. HERMAN HELMS HOUSE 1878** ⇄  
Helms, a baker and saloon keeper, came to Jacksonville in 1856 and became owner of the Table Rock Saloon.

**39. H. JUDGE HARNESS c1858**  
A saddlery and harness shop.

**40. HOCKENJOS-FICK HOUSE 1878** ⇄  
Built by John Hockenjos. First renter — Nicholas Fick

**41. JACKSON COUNTY COURTHOUSE 1883**  
Built of local brick and stone. Served as the County Seat for 43 years.

**42. JACKSON COUNTY JAIL 1911**  
Presently houses Art Presence.

**43. JACKSONVILLE CEMETERY 1860**  
First burial in 1859, one year prior to the time the city acquired the 30 acres for cemetery use. Sexton's Tool House 1878. Trap door in floor permitted temporary storage of bodies until graves could be prepared.

**44. JACKSONVILLE'S FIRST SCHOOLHOUSE c1856** ⇄  
South portion of present house was first school in Jacksonville.

**45. JAMES ELLIOT HOUSE 1902** ⇄ ⇄

**46. JEREMIAH NUNAN HOUSE c1890** ⇄  
Nunan was a prominent Jacksonville merchant. Plans and materials were ordered from a catalog in the East and delivered by train.

**47. JOHN BEAUVENUE HOUSE 1890** ⇄  
French Canadian homestead settler.

**48. JOHN BILGER HOUSE 1863** ⇄  
Built by Fehely and Linn. The walks surrounding the house are of native sandstone. Bilger was a hardware merchant.

**49. JUDGE COLVIG HOUSE 1875** ⇄  
Prosperous attorney, Superintendent of Schools, and early Indian historian. Father of Vance Colvig (Bozo the Clown).

**50. JUDGE HANNA HOUSE c1870** ⇄ ★  
Father and son both prominent judges. Occupied by Hanna families for nearly 100 years.

**51. JUDGE TOUVELLE HOUSE 1916** ★  
The facade of the house encompasses an older structure built in 1867 by William Hoffman, a leader of the community.

**52. J.W. McCULLY BUILDING 1855**  
Upper Floor was a Jewish Synagogue in the 1850's. Lower floor, a general merchandise store. Acquired by Odd Fellows Lodge No. 10 in 1860.

**53. KAHLER HOUSE c1895** ⇄

**54. KAHLER'S LAW OFFICE 1886**  
Office of Wesley Kahler.

**55. KAREWSKI HOUSE c1856** ⇄ ⇄  
Gustav Karewski, a merchant and owner of early grist mill. Arrived in Jacksonville about 1854.

**56. KENNEDY'S TIN SHOP 1861**  
Later sold to Love and Bilger, longtime tinsmiths.

**57. KUBLI BUILDING 1884**  
Erected by George W. Holt, brick mason, who also built U.S. Hotel. Lower floor housed J. Nunan's 'FARMERS AND MINERS SUPPLIES' during 1880.

**58. KUBLI HOUSE 1860** ⇄ ⇄  
Kasper Kubli, a storekeeper, printer and telegraph operator, migrated to Jacksonville from Canton Glarus, Switzerland.

**59. LOVE HOUSE c1854** ⇄  
Acquired in 1857 by John S. Love who owned a hardware store and tin shop.

**60. MAGRUDER HOUSE 1871** ⇄

**61. MARK APPLGATE HOUSE c1895** ⇄

**62. MARTIN & ZIGLER BLACKSMITH SHOP 1859**  
Also served a number of retail merchants. Notice how the facade meshes with the Masonic Building.

**63. MASONIC HALL 1875**  
Warren Lodge No. 10 was organized in 1857. Former site of Eldorado Saloon, destroyed by fire in 1874.

**64. MAX MUELLER HOUSE 1888** ⇄  
Italianate double bay structure added to earlier partially burned 1870's building.

**65. MELISSA C. TAYLOR HOUSE 1910** ⇄ ⇄★  
A well-designed example of post-1900 era residential architecture built during the orchard boom period in Rogue Valley.

**66. M.G. KENNEDY HOUSE 1855** ⇄  
Kennedy was first marshal of Jacksonville.

**67. MILLER GUNSMITH SHOP c1858**  
Old forge is still in basement.

**68. MILO CATON HOUSE c1902** ⇄ ⇄

**69. MINERVA ARMSTRONG HOUSE 1858** ⇄ ⇄  
The Armstrong family occupied the house for 35 years. First home of Mr. & Mrs. C.C. Beekman.

**70. MOORE HOUSE 1878** ⇄

**71. NEUBER'S JEWELRY STORE 1862**  
Later became known as "NEUBER'S SALOON & CARD ROOM".

**72. OBENCHAIN HOUSE c1866** ⇄

**73. ORTH BUILDING 1872**  
The upper floor included a popular dance hall and hotel rooms. Lower floor sign read 'E. JACOBS, PRODUCE AND HIDES TAKEN IN EXCHANGE'.

**74. ORTH HOUSE 1880** ⇄  
John Orth, early butcher and owner of the Orth Building.

**75. OWEN KEEGAN HOUSE c1865** ⇄

**76. P.J. RYAN HOTEL BUILDING c1856** ⇄

**77. PLYMALE HOUSE c1865** ⇄ ⇄★  
Original owner, Henry Breithbarth, operator of Bella Union Saloon. Later purchased by the Plymale family.

**78. PURSELL LOG CABIN 1930** ⇄  
Built of large diameter peeled logs.

**79. REDMEN'S HALL 1884**  
Improved Order of Redmen, Pocahontas No. 1, established 1870, this was a prominent civic organization of that era. Members mostly of German descent. Club records were written in German script.

**80. REUTER HOUSE c1895** ⇄

**81. ROGUE RIVER ELECTRIC COMPANY 1905**  
Early power substation.

**82. ROGUE RIVER VALLEY RAILWAY DEPOT 1891**  
Railroad line connected Jacksonville and nearby Medford until 1925. Chamber of Commerce office and Visitors Center.

**83. RYAN & MORGAN GENERAL STORE 1863** ★  
A variety of businesses have been located here. A saddlery, clothing store, Chinese laundry, livery stable and Oregon Sentinel newspaper office.

**84. SACHS BROTHERS DRY GOODS 1861**  
This store was referred to as "The Temple of Fashion" in it's grand opening advertising dated July 10, 1861.

**85. SCHUMPF BARBER SHOP 1874**

**86. SCHULTZ HOUSE 1874** ⇄

**87. ST. ANDREWS METHODIST-EPISCOPAL CHURCH 1854**  
Oldest church south of Willamette Valley. Truly a community church, as it was shared on alternate Sundays by the Presbyterians and five other denominations for twenty-five years. Started in 1853 by Rev. Joseph S. Smith and completed in 1854 by Rev. T.F. Royal.

**88. ST. ANDREWS PARSONAGE** ⇄

**89. ST. JOSEPH'S ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH 1858**  
First Church service held in 1860. Building completed and dedicated by Archbishop Francis Blanchet. Was the center for many missions in early years.

**90. SUTTON'S DRUG STORE c1856**  
First all brick building on this side of the street.

**91. TELEPHONE BUILDING c1940**  
Property donated by Dr. Jackson, and added on to at least twice.

**92. TABLE ROCK BILLIARD SALOON 1859**  
Owned by Herman Helms and partner M. Wintgen. Interior destroyed by fire in 1960.

**93. THOMAS G. REAMES HOUSE 1868** ⇄ ⇄★  
Qualified as Sheriff in 1868, was Postal Inspector for Oregon in 1886.

**94. TURNER HOUSE c1867** ⇄ ⇄  
William M. Turner was editor of the Oregon Sentinel. He was also a special Indian Agent and a telegraph operator.

**95. TYPICAL HOUSE c1890** ⇄

**96. U. S. HOTEL, 1880**  
Built by George Holt to fulfill a courtship promise to his fiancée Madame Jeanne De Reboam. First guests were President Rutherford B. Hayes and party. A portion of ground floor serves historically recreated branch of U.S. Bank. History Store and Museum Exhibits on 3rd Streetside.

**97. WADE, MORGAN & CO. 1861**  
Private museum 1972-1984, artifacts are still to be seen on the walls and ceiling.

**98. WILL JACKSON, DD — OFFICE 1868** ⇄
